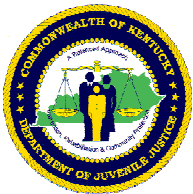
SYMPOSIUM INFORMATION

DJJ OFFERS SEXUAL OFFENDER TREATMENT TRAINING

The Department of Juvenile Justice has developed two new courses that address the treatment and assessment of juvenile sexual offenders. The **Juvenile Sexual Offender Treatment Provider Certification (JSOTPC)** is designed for counselors, counselor supervisors, and assessors who provide services to juveniles who have been adjudicated of a sexual offense and their families. The **Juvenile Sexual Offender Juvenile Service Worker Certification (JSOJSWC)** course is designed for Juvenile Service Workers who provide community supervision to juveniles and their families while in the community. The intent of these trainings is to help participants understand the current research, philosophies, and trends regarding this population and to provide information regarding: the assessment process, specialized treatment & planning, family engagement & reunification, supervision strategies, re-entry considerations, self-care, and Kentucky statutes.

DJJ HISTORICAL PERSPECTIVE

In October 2008, JJTC began gathering data in order to prepare a historical review of juvenile residential services spanning 1975-2008. David Reis began to compile data to help establish the history of the Department before his retirement in 2008. Through his initial efforts, along with other DJJ staff, Commissioner Haws has given full support to the compilation of the report. Mary Salsman-Buckley and Richard Thomas have led DJJ's involvement in recording the history.

JJTC staff, Cindi Miller and Amanda True, have been meeting with key individuals, reviewing newspaper archives, scanning documents and correspondence, piecing together a part of history that reflects Kentucky's role in residential care for committed youth. To date, over 60 interviews have been conducted with prominent former (CRS and DYS) employees and current DJJ staff.

It is likely that a draft report will be distributed to the committee in late June. The report will describe key events, agency accomplishments, timelines and listing of key officials in five-year increments. Also included will be a comprehensive appendix which will compile important documents and correspondence, reports, charts, and articles.

CAMPBELL RECEIVES GANG CERTIFICATION

DJJ trainer, William Campbell, recently completed the “**Gangs Specialist Certification Course**”, held April 1-3, 2009 in North Riverside, Illinois. This comprehensive, labor intensive course was presented by Officer Frank Petrone, president of GANG Prevention Incorporated, and addressed street gangs, prison gangs, security threat groups and supremacist groups. The course covered the two main factions, Folks & People Nation; hand sign/handshakes; advanced physical identification; advanced graffiti interpretation; a look into the world of criminal organizations; and, an overview of additional threat and terrorist groups. Training was also provided in court room testimony training in the event that participants were called to testify as an expert witness.

This course is available only to sworn law enforcement (peace) officers or official members of other governmental entities. Applicants were subject to employment verification, criminal history checks, tattoo checks, and any other security clearances deemed necessary by Gang Prevention Incorporated. Participants were required to pass a 250 question written exam with a 90% or better to be certified in

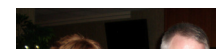
JONES APPOINTED AS TRC DIRECTOR
